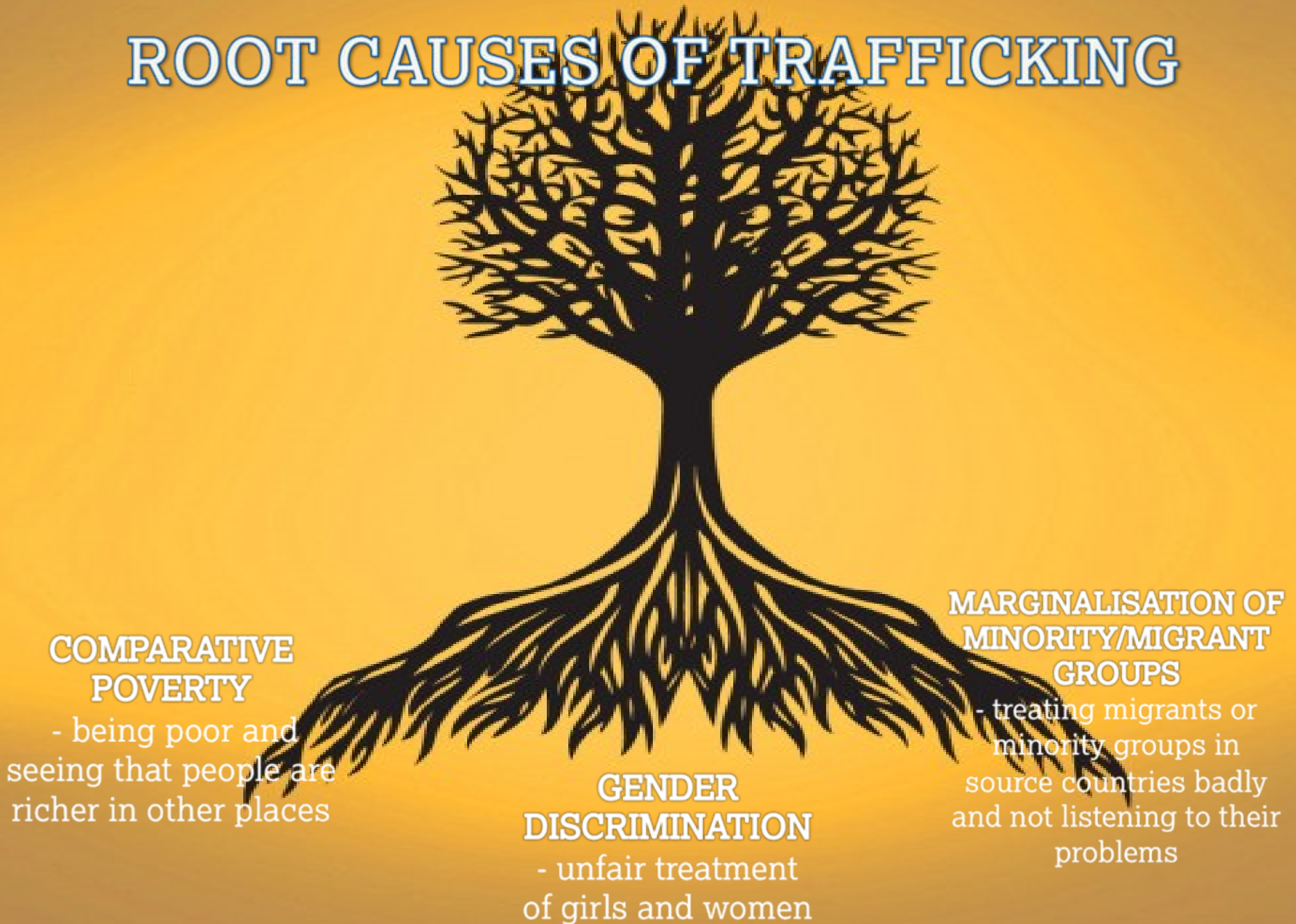

ROOT CAUSES OF TRAFFICKING

LACK OF ACCCESS TO EDUCATION & JOBS

- people not being able to go to school or get a job where they live. They may trust a trafficker promising education or work in a different place.

NATURAL DISASTERS & POLITICAL INSTABILITY

- this can lead to children being left without parents. Chaos in society can mean that the vulnerable are not protected.

DEMAND FOR CHEAP LABOUR

- people cutting costs by not paying workers enough, this leads to the temptation to get traffickers to supply labour for very little cost.
